Museum Associates has been selected as one of five charitable organizations supported during the 2023 Tigers on the Prowl event. Over the past ten years, Tigers on the Prowl raised funds for numerous Columbia charities. MA is honored to be selected as one of this year's charities. Museum Associates received \$119,492.55 from the estate of Miriam Dyak, daughter of Saul and Gladys Weinberg. These funds come from a trust established for Miriam by her parents naming Museum Associates, Weinberg Trust, as the beneficiary upon Miriam's death. As instructed, the funds will be deposited into the MA

Weinberg Trust for ancient acquisitions. We are very grateful for this gift; however, we are saddened by Miriam's passing.

#### Museum Renovations Update




Significant progress has been made on the renovations to the Museum's spaces on the lower level of Ellis Library. Removing the old suspended ceiling tiles has opened up the space, giving more of a "gallery" feel to the hallways and to the two large rooms that will house the European and American Art permanent collection and temporary exhibitions. The old fluorescent box lights are gone and will be replaced with museumgrade track lighting. Curator Rima Girnius has been refreshing the research on works that will be on display, writing new labels and wall panel texts highlighting themes and connections among the works, and testing gallery layout designs on scale models.

While the basic renovations to the Weinberg Gallery of Antiquities were completed late last year, Curator Benton Kidd and staff have been working on the details of that gallery—painting the interior of the built-in cases, building new custom floor mounted

pedestals and wall mounted cases, and laying out and installing the antiquities piece-by-piece (in many cases using paper or cardboard mock-ups at first), and writing new labels.

The Museum is waiting on a schedule for completion. We will update everyone as soon as we know the details. Please note the Museum's new identity graphic above!

#### Art of the Book Club

The Museum's Art of the Book Club is reading Death on the Nile by Agatha Christie this fall. The famous novel takes place in Egypt making for good connection to the Museum of Art and Archaeology's antiquities collection.

New is the Book Club's partnership with Osher Lifelong Learning @ Mizzou which will introduce new audiences to the Museum's programming. Four hybrid classes will be offered, each on a Tuesday: September 12, 19, 26, and October 3 from 3:00-4:30pm at the city's Moss Building, 1905 Hillcrest Drive, in person or online.

Discussions of the book and film as well as a lecture about ancient Egypt will be led by Art of the Book Club founder Christiane Quinn, and docents Barb Montgomery and Valerie Hammons, prospectively. The Museum's Curator of Antiquities, Benton Kidd, will close out the series with a session on "Egyptomania," the multimillion-dollar pop culture phenomenon that romanticized Egypt and North Africa in literature, art, and architecture.

### Spotlight from the Museum's Collection



Artists employed a variety of materials to create the underlying structure or support for their paintings. The most striking among these are polished slabs of colored stone, often with distinctive markings and striations that artists incorporated in their compositions.

The Museum is fortunate to have in its permanent collection a small devotional painting on mahogany obsidian, a stone formed from rapidly cooling lava. It depicts an episode from the life of early Christian martyr St. Catherine of Alexandria. Apocryphal texts describe how Roman Emperor Maxentius, angered by her steadfast faith, had her tortured and beheaded. Miraculously, milk instead of blood poured from her severed neck as a sign of her purity.

The painting shows a moment not long after Catherine's execution. Her body lies in a crumpled heap as two angels attend to her body. One cradles her radiant head in a cloth while another pulls up her gown to preserve her modesty. The stone's brightly hued veining indicates the presence of the divine and the miraculous nature of the scene.■
