Art in the Park: June 3rd (10am-5pm) and June 4th (10am-4pm)

The Museum of Art and Archaeology is sponsoring "Barter Boat" at the Columbia Art League's Art in the Park. Captained by a trio of artists, "Barter Boat" is a carnival-inspired public art project that travels from city-to-city, interacting with passersby by bartering to collect everyday items, and then curating those items into small, handheld assemblages. The packaged items are then traded at other stops. To date, "Barter Boat" has visited ten cities across the country.

Part performance art, part temporary art installation, "Barter Boat" engages with people about items that are important to them. Asking questions like 'Who owned this object?' and 'Why is this item important to the person who had it?', and documenting responses, the project "focuses on moments of generosity and engages audiences through the act of barter, oral storytelling, and visual art." At its core, "Barter Boat" invites interaction through trades of small, personal articles. It is an exploration of emotional and philosophical value versus the more common focus on monetary pricing. Those who participate in the barter experience are prompted to think about the material items they value, what they consider as throw-aways, and how sometimes seemingly small and inconsequential items actually hold deep meaning to their owner.

Desiree Moore, on faculty at MU's School of Visual Studies, is one of the three artists involved in the creation of "Barter Boat" which is just one aspect of the collective called RADAR Art. Moore first contacted the Museum about a collaboration.

Spotlight from the Museum's Collection



Spoon with a Dedicatory Inscription to Hekate Roman, 2nd–3rd century CE Silver (74.147) The lustrous allure of silver has made it a favorite medium since antiquity. Wealthy ancient Egyptians were willing to pay to import it from Mesopotamia, some 1,000 miles from the Nile Valley. By 900 BCE, the sprawling Phoenician trade network allegedly reached as far as the British Isles, but southern Spain supplied staggering quantities of silver. Phoenician sailors were said to be in possession of so much silver at one point that they made ships' anchors from it. Greek craftsmen fashioned opulent silver implements for the service of wine, and Romans would continue production of fine silverware for ceremonious dining. Owned by a Greek named Eutyches living in the Roman Empire, a silver spoon in the Museum's collection was once probably part of an elegant set few could afford. What drove Eutyches to part with one of his prized silver spoons is somewhat mysterious given the inscription reveals that he dedicated it to Hekate, a goddess of witchcraft and black magic.
