While the renovations continue, we remain busy behind the scenes planning exhibitions and programming, continuing to unpack and organize our more than 16,000 objects, and generally getting settled in our new home in Ellis Library.

Speaking of planning, the Museum's new educator, Julie Chatman, starts this month. A longtime Columbia resident, Julie brings a wealth of experience to the position, most recently as the art specialist for Columbia Public

School's (CPS) Center for Gifted Education where she developed and delivered a curriculum focused on art, history, and creativity for more than 700 students each year. She also has a background in graphic design, art direction, and publication management and worked at Mizzou and Stephens College before joining CPS. Julie holds a Master of Art Education from MU and a bachelor's degree from Central Missouri State University. She also has a master's degree in gifted education. Among Julie's duties is restarting our docent program—and we can always use new docent recruits, so stay tuned on that front.

Spotlight from the Museum's Collection

Scholars suggest that one third of the world's population lived in the Roman empire by the second century CE. Extending over three continents, the immense territory encompassed a myriad of cultures but the people who composed those cultures all identified as "Roman" citizens. We find a remarkable example of the empire's cultural intermingling in the gravestone of Levitha, a woman who was not only part of the vast Roman populace but also a Syrian. Her image clearly conveys both: the pose is meant to impart modesty, a compulsory virtue expected of Roman women, but the turban and hairstyle are markedly eastern. Moreover, though her funerary inscription is in Greek, the root in her name (levi-) is likely Semitic in origin. The inscription provides her name, death date (calculated on a Greek calendar), and a final note, perhaps indicating that she was suffering:

"Farewell noble Levitha, free from pain. Year 408."
